The San Diego Park Dis-trict Procedural Ordinance of 1969, approved by the council in February, provides for creation of open space assessment districts.

The petitions pointed out that the open space is needed to "retain the balance of nature while reducing noise and air pollution, preserve a natural habitat for our children, save land for future park, retain an area that will enhance community identity and value and preserve nat-ural slopes, trees and streams."
