# Thirty Years of Crime in the San Diego Region: 1984 through 2013

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A SANDAG CJ BULLETIN

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# **INTRODUCTION**

Since 1980, SANDAG has been reporting regional crime statistics for the San Diego region through a cooperative agreement with local law enforcement agencies. This report presents and discusses crime trend data for the past 30 years. Crime rates per 1,000 resident population,<sup>1</sup> as well as the actual number of crimes reported are presented. SANDAG is the only local entity to compile and analyze these statistics historically across the 18 incorporated cities, as well as the unincorporated areas of the county, making this information some of the most frequently requested from the SANDAG Criminal Justice Clearinghouse. These data are useful to local law enforcement, policy makers, and the community, in general, in tracking public safety over time, as well as the effectiveness of prevention and response efforts on regional crime rates.

# **OVERALL CRIME**

There was a total of 81.898 Part I crimes in the San Diego region in 2013 (Appendix Tables 1 and 5) which equated to 26.00 crimes per 1,000 population (Appendix Table 2). Part I crimes include four violent offenses (homicide, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) and three property offenses (burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft) that are tracked nationwide in a standardized manner by the FBI with agencies submitting crime data through the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) system. Other crimes, such as drug-related offenses, vandalism, and fraud, are also documented by local law enforcement as Part II crimes. However, because categorization schemes can vary across agencies, standardized numbers for Part II crimes are not available, even though these crimes may be sizeable in number and require substantial attention and resources from law enforcement.

# **FAST FACTS**

- The 2013 regional violent crime rate of 3.66 per 1,000 population was the second lowest in the past 30 years and represented a 5 percent decrease from 2012.
- There were 72 homicides in the San Diego region in 2013, a 33 percent decrease from 2012 when there were 107. More homicides in 2013 were tied to an argument, compared to 2012, and fewer were gang-motivated. In addition, the number of homicides related to child abuse decreased from 13 in 2012 to 2 in 2013.
- The number of robberies reported across the region decreased 4 percent overall, but the number of bank robberies increased 22 percent, from 79 in 2012 to 96 in 2013.
- Eighteen percent (18%) of robberies and 11 percent of aggravated assaults involved the use of a firearm in 2013.
- Property crime rates were up slightly over the past year (<1%), with the increase tied to a greater number of larcenies.
- The total value of property stolen on any one day in the San Diego region in 2013 was almost \$482,000 and only 18 percent of it was recovered.
- While residential burglaries were down in 2013, non-residential burglaries were up. Over half (54%) of all burglaries involved no forced entry.
- The number of reported motor vehicle thefts was at a 30-year low in 2013, down to 11,288, a decrease of 8 percent from 2012.
- The number of violent crimes against senior citizens was up slightly over the past year (4%), as was the number of domestic violence crimes reported to law enforcement (2%).



# **VIOLENT CRIME**

In 2013, there were 11,515 Part I violent crimes reported to law enforcement in the San Diego region (Appendix Tables 1 and 6).<sup>2</sup> The most common type was aggravated assault, which represented about two-thirds (67%) of all violent crimes in 2013; robbery represented 27 percent, rape 6 percent, and homicide 1 percent. According to statistics from the National Crime Victimization Survey,<sup>3</sup> 44 percent of violent crime was reported to law enforcement nationwide in 2012 (not shown).

As Figure 1 shows, the violent crime rate (per 1,000 population) in the San Diego region increased in the later part of the 1980s, reaching a peak of 9.76 in 1992.<sup>4</sup> Since then, it declined to 3.53 violent crimes per 1,000 residents in 2011, which was a 30-year low. Possible factors related to this overall drop in crime since the 1990s could include legislation which increased jail and prison time for violent offenses, cross-jurisdictional task forces targeting gang activity and utilizing intelligence-led policing, and the implementation of effective crime prevention programs. Between 2011 and 2012, the rate increased 10 percent (to 3.87) but it dropped again in 2013 by 5 percent (to 3.66). This 2013 rate was the second lowest in the past 30 years.

Across jurisdictions, the 2013 violent crime rate ranged from .47 to 5.67 (Appendix Table 3 and Appendix Map 1). Over the past year, 18 jurisdictions had lower, 4 had higher, and 1 had the same violent crime rate, compared to 2012 (3 had numbers too small for valid comparisons). The size of the one-year decreases ranged from -5 percent in San Diego, Vista, and Poway, to -38 percent in Fallbrook.


Annual statistics through 2012 from the FBI were used to compare changes over time in the violent crime rate reported in the San Diego region to those reported across the United States. As Figure 2 shows, the San Diego region experienced a greater rise in violent crime in the late 1980s and early 1990s, compared to the nation, returning to a similar violent crime rate after 1998. This increase was possibly related to the prevalence of methamphetamine distribution and use in the region during this time period. In 2012, the violent crime rate in the San Diego region was 3.87, versus 3.86 for the nation as a whole.

While calendar year 2012 represents the most current annual crime statistics available at the national level at the time of this publication, preliminary mid-year 2013 statistics released by the FBI show a 5.4 percent decrease in the violent crime rate nationally, compared to the same point in 2012. This national decline was also reported across the four regions of the United States, with 7.4 percent decrease in the Midwest. а 5.9 percent in the South, 4.3 percent in the Northeast, and 3.7 percent in the West. Western states include Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming, Alaska, California, Hawaii, Oregon, and Washington (not shown).

Additional analyses of these preliminary mid-year 2013 data for Western cities with populations greater than 500,000 revealed fewer violent crimes between January and June 2013, compared to 2012 (ranging from -6% in Fresno, CA to -11% in Los Angeles and San Jose, CA). Among the five large California cities, four had lower numbers the first half of 2013, with the exception of San Francisco (Table 1).



# Homicide

Over the past 30 years, the number of homicides in the San Diego region peaked at 278 in 1991 and decreased fairly steadily to 86 in 1998 (Figure 3). Since then, the number of homicides has fluctuated but has not gone lower than 67 (in 2010) or exceeded 130 (in 2003) (not shown). In 2013, there were a total of 72 homicides, which was a 33 percent decrease from the 107 reported in 2012 (Figure 3), and the biggest decrease of the seven crime types.


In both 2012 and 2013, there were three primary motives which accounted for more than twothirds of all homicides where motive could be determined (59 of 85 homicides in 2012 and 41 of 49 in 2013): an argument, domestic violence, or gang-related. Between 2012 and 2013, the proportion of gang-motivated homicides decreased, down to 18 percent, compared to 31 percent in 2012, possibly reflecting pro-active efforts by law enforcement to prevent retaliatory violence before it could occur. At the same time, arguments represented the motive in a greater number of homicides in 2013, compared to 2012 (45% versus 21%), and the proportion tied to domestic violence remained relatively stable (20% in 2012, versus 19% in 2013). Child abuse was described as the motive for 13 homicide cases in 2012, but only 2 in 2013. The other six homicides in 2013, where motive could be determined, included two each tied to arson and elder abuse, and one each to drugs and what was described as a "thrill killing" (not shown).

# Rape

There were 674 rapes reported in the San Diego region in 2013, which was a 4 percent decrease from 2012 (699) (Appendix Tables 1 and 8), despite the more inclusive definition of what actions constitute rape that took effect in 2013.<sup>5</sup> Further analyses revealed that while the number of completed rapes increased 1 percent (from 511 in 2012 to 514 in 2013), the number of attempted rapes reported to law enforcement decreased 15 percent (from 181 to 154) (not shown). In 2013, 23 percent of reported rapes were categorized as "attempted." The number of rapes, either attempted or completed, that are reported may be tied in part to education and outreach efforts encouraging victims to do so.

As Figure 4 shows, the number of reported rapes has remained relatively stable over the past 30 years, compared to the number of other types of violent crimes during the same period of time. The greatest number of rapes reported to law enforcement was 969 in 1991 and the lowest was 596 in 1985.


# Robbery

Over the past 30 years, the greatest number of robberies was reported in 1992 (8,554) and the smallest number was reported in 2011 (3,050). This low was followed by a 5 percent increase in 2012 (3,206) and a 4 percent drop to 3,069 in 2013 (Figure 5 and Appendix Tables 1 and 8). The 3,069 robberies in 2013 was the second lowest number reported in the past 30 years.

As part of standardized UCR reporting requirements, the type of weapon used during a robbery and the location of the robbery are documented. In 2013, 18 percent of robberies involved a firearm, 11 percent a knife or other cutting instrument, 10 percent another weapon (i.e., bat, stick, or other blunt object), and the majority (60%) were considered strong-arm. Between 2012 and 2013, robberies involving a firearm and strong-arm decreased (11% and 5%, respectively) while those involving a knife and other weapons increased slightly (2% and 3%, respectively) (not shown).

In 2013, almost half (46%) of robberies occurred out in the open, on streets, or in other public places, 31 percent in commercial establishments, 11 percent in other locations (which includes wooded areas, churches, schools, and other public buildings), 8 percent in residences, and 3 percent in banks. Robberies in commercial establishments and banks increased from the prior year (3% and 22%, respectively), while those on highways, in residences, and other locations decreased (10%, 9%, and 2%, respectively) (not shown).


For the 12 jurisdictions with robbery numbers large enough for comparison in 2012 and 2013, 9 experienced a decrease in the number of robberies (ranging from -2% in Escondido to -27% in La Mesa) and the other three experienced an increase (from 4% in Oceanside to 9% in Chula Vista and San Marcos) (Appendix Tables 13 and 14).

# **Aggravated Assault**

Over the past 30 years, the number of aggravated assaults followed an upward trend from 1985 (5,624) that peaked in 1994 (15,406). This overall increase was due at least in part to 1986 legislation requiring law enforcement agencies to report all domestic violence incidents. Since 1994, these numbers have generally declined, with another drop in 2013 to 7,700, from 8,089 in 2012 (-5%) (Figure 6 and Appendix Tables 1 and 8).<sup>6</sup> The 7,700 aggravated assaults reported in 2013 were the fifth lowest in the past 30 years.

Like robbery, the type of weapon used in aggravated assaults is documented for reporting purposes. In 2013, 40 percent of aggravated assaults involved the use of another weapon (e.g., bat, stick, or other blunt object), 30 percent hands, feet, or fists, 19 percent a knife or other cutting instrument, and 11 percent a firearm. The number of aggravated assaults involving hands, feet, or fists increased over the past year (1%); the number involving firearms and other weapons decreased (-1% and -17%, respectively); and there was no change in the number involving knives (not shown).

For the 21 jurisdictions with numbers large enough to compare, 16 experienced a one-year decrease in the number of reported aggravated assaults, ranging from -2 percent in Escondido to -40 percent in Valley Center, and 5 experienced an increase, ranging from 1 percent in Chula Vista to 18 percent in Lemon Grove (Appendix Tables 13 and 14).

# **Violent Crime against Senior Citizens**

Each jurisdiction also voluntarily documents violent crimes committed against senior citizens (individuals 60 years of age and older). In 2013, there were 593 violent crimes against senior citizens, an increase of 4 percent from the previous year. In 2013, these violent crimes against seniors included 6 homicides, 12 rapes, 177 robberies, and 398 aggravated assaults. Of the ten reporting agencies, only the San Diego Police Department and the Sheriff's Department had numbers large enough to compare over time. The San Diego Police Department (from 288 in 2012 to 321 in 2013) and the Sheriff reported a decrease of 14 percent (from 156 to 134) (not shown).

# **PROPERTY CRIME**

With 70,383 property crimes reported in 2013 (Appendix Tables 1 and 7), 1 in every 45 residents was the victim of a property crime (not shown).<sup>7</sup> The 2013 property crime rate of 22.34 was less than 1 percent higher than it was in 2012 and represented the fourth lowest rate in the past 30 years (Figure 7). Most crime (86%) reported to law enforcement represented property versus violent offenses, and of these property crimes, 64 percent represented larcenies in 2013, 20 percent burglaries, and 16 percent motor vehicle thefts (not shown).

Across the region, 2013 property crime rates ranged from 8.18 in Ramona to 42.63 per 1,000 residents in Del Mar (Appendix Table 4 and Appendix Map 2).<sup>8</sup> Thirteen (13) jurisdictions had a lower property crime rate in 2013 compared to 2012 (with decreases ranging from -1% in San Diego to -50% in Ramona) and 12 had a higher rate (with increases ranging from 1% in National City to 20% in 4S Ranch). When interpreting these statistics, it is important to note that a variety of factors can affect a jurisdiction's



crime rate, such as daytime population and accessibility.


In terms of dollar value, over \$175.9 million worth of property was stolen in the San Diego region in 2013, which equates to around \$481,931 on average per day. This amount reflected a 1 percent decrease from the \$178.1 million stolen in 2012 (Appendix Table 17). Eighteen percent (18%) of this property, which was valued at \$31.9 million, was recovered in 2013, compared to 21 percent and \$36.7 million recovered in 2012 (Appendix Tables 18 and 19). This lower property recovery rate (which was actually 44% in 2004 and declined each year since then) could possibly reflect fewer sworn officers per capita in the region and the strategic focus on violent crime in the past few years, as well as the greater ease with which stolen property can be dispersed, including the internet.

Figure 8 compares property crimes reported to law enforcement in the San Diego region to

national statistics from 1984 through 2012 (the most recent annual statistics available, as previously noted). In 1984, the San Diego region had a higher property crime rate compared to the United States overall. The local property crime rate began to decline in the early 1990s, falling and remaining below the national average since 1995. In 2012, the property crime rate for the region was 22.29, compared to 28.59 for the nation.

Preliminary mid-year 2013 national statistics released by the FBI also show a decrease (-5.4%) in the property crime rate from mid-year 2012. Across the four regions of the United States, the FBI reported that property crime had decreased -9.3 percent in the Midwest, -8.1 percent in the Northeast, -5.5 percent in the South, and -1 percent in the West (not shown).

Additional analyses of preliminary mid-year 2013 property crime statistics for Western cities with populations greater than 500,000 revealed that

four of the eight had some level of increase (ranging from 1% in Phoenix, AZ to 23% in San Francisco) and the other four decreased from 2 percent (in Los Angeles, CA) to 10 percent (in Fresno, CA). Within California specifically, two of the large cities reported a decrease and three reported an increase.

# **Burglary**


Burglary is the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The number of (including residential burglaries and nonresidential) reported in the region declined between 1981 (not shown) and 1984, and then began an upward trend reaching 35,233 in 1988 (Figure 9). Three years later, an eight-year decline began reaching a low of 15,230 in 1999. Since then, the number of burglaries fluctuated until 2008, with three consecutive decreases to 13,326 in 2011. The number jumped to 14,082 in 2012, but then declined slightly in 2013 (to 13,991) (Appendix Tables 1 and 8).

How were burglaries accomplished and where did they occur? Burglaries are categorized into one of three categories: forced entry, no forced entry, or unsuccessful. In 2013, over half of all burglaries (54%) were categorized as no forced entry, 36 percent as forced entry, and 10 percent as attempted/unsuccessful (not shown). Of the 13,991 burglaries reported in the San Diego region in 2013, 62 percent were residential, which equates to 1 in every 128 households being burglarized. Over the past year, the number of residential burglaries decreased by 8 percent (from 9,377 to 8,663) while the number of nonresidential burglaries increased 13 percent from 4,705 to 5,328 (Appendix Tables 13 and 14).

Over the past year, 13 jurisdictions reported oneyear decreases (ranging from -6% in Escondido to -51% in Coronado), 11 had increases (from 1% in La Mesa to 41% in Lemon Grove), and 1 had no change (El Cajon) (Appendix Tables 13 and 14).

#### NUMBER OF BURGLARIES DECREASED OVER PAST YEAR





#### Larceny

Larceny, or theft, is the most common crime, with 1 in every 70 residents being a victim in 2013 (not shown). Beginning in 1985, the number of larcenies reported in the San Diego region began an upward trend, peaking at 85,448 in 1989, and then decreasing to 47,851 in 2000. Since then, there were four years of consecutive increases, followed by seven consecutive decreases, to a 30year low in 2011 of 40,425. The increase in 2013 was the second annual and represented a 4 percent increase from 2012 (43,429 to 45,104) (Figure 10, Appendix Tables 1 and 8).



The most common larceny type (historically and in 2013) was theft from inside motor vehicles (37%), with the second most common from buildings (20%). Six of the seven larceny types increased in number from 2012 to 2013, from the 2 percent increase in thefts from motor vehicles (16,554 to 16,857) to the 25 percent increase in thefts of bicycles (3,088 to 3,858). The only larceny type to decrease, by less than 1 percent, was thefts from buildings (9,021 to 8,999). Most larcenies (58%) in 2013 were petty thefts, involving property valued at \$400 or less (not shown).

Across the region, 13 of the jurisdictions reported an annual increase in the number of larcenies (ranging from <1% in San Diego to 28% in Coronado and 4S Ranch), 11 reported a decrease (ranging from -2% in Carlsbad to -48% in Ramona), and 1 had no change (Lakeside) (Appendix Tables 13 and 14).

# **Motor Vehicle Theft**

Figure 11 shows the number of motor vehicle thefts in the region for the past 30 years. Starting in 1984, the number of motor vehicles stolen in the San Diego region increased annually, reaching a high in 1989 of 40,897. This upward trend was followed by an overall decrease to 17,038 in 2000. Since then, there was a general increase to 24,435 in 2007, with four consecutive decreases to 11,346 in 2011 (Appendix Table 8). While the number increased in 2012, it was back down in 2013, to a new 30-year low at 11,288 (an 8% drop from the previous year). This equates to 1 in every 222 registered motor vehicles being stolen that year, compared to 1 in 169 in 2009. In terms of dollar amount, the value of these stolen vehicles was estimated at over \$65.3 million, representing 37 percent of the total value of property stolen (not shown).

Across the 21 jurisdictions with more than 30 incidents of motor vehicle theft reported in 2012 and 2013, 10 reported one-year decreases in the number of motor vehicle thefts (-7% in San Diego and Encinitas to -39% in Fallbrook and Valley Center) and 9 reported increases (2% in

Escondido to 36% in Poway). Two jurisdictions had no change (Vista and Lakeside) (Appendix Tables 13 and 14).


# Arson

Unlike other FBI Index offenses, when arson is committed in concert with another FBI Index offense, both incidents must be reported, which is why arson is presented separately from other property crime statistics. There were 350 arsons reported in 2013, which was just 2 fewer than the 352 reported in 2012 (Appendix Tables 13 and 14). Forty-six percent (46%) of arsons in 2013 were of structures and 54 percent were categorized as mobile and other non-structural property types (not shown).

# **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE**

Law enforcement agencies also track domestic violence incidents, some of which are included in the previously reported numbers in this bulletin. For example, a domestic violence incident could include a Part I violent crime (e.g., aggravated assault) or some type of property crime (e.g., burglary). Since 1986, when mandatory reporting was enacted, the number of domestic violence incidents has varied from 11,414 in that year to a high of 29,306 in 1994 (Figure 12). In 2013, a total of 16,689 incidents were reported to law enforcement, an increase of 2 percent from 2012 (Appendix Table 9).

Across the jurisdictions, 11 reported one-year increases in the number of domestic violence incidents (ranging from 1% in San Diego and Chula Vista to 34% in El Cajon), 6 reported decreases (ranging from -5% in Oceanside to -15% in Lemon Grove), 1 had no change (Encinitas), and 1 had numbers too small to compare (Del Mar) (Appendix Table 9).


# HATE CRIMES

As part of California Penal Code, the Attorney General is required to submit an annual report to the Legislature regarding crimes motivated by a victim's race, ethnicity, religion, gender, sexual orientation, national origin, or physical or mental disability. Beginning in 2008, SANDAG asked local law enforcement agencies to share hate crime reports that were to be submitted to the State to allow for more timely statistics, as well as more detailed analysis for San Diego County not available in the State report.

According to the California Penal Code, a hate crime is a criminal act committed in whole or in part because of the actual or perceived characteristics of the victim (described previously). Thus, hate crimes are not separate distinct crimes, but rather traditional offenses specifically motivated by the offender's bias. In 2013, a total of 105 hate crime events were reported by law enforcement from across the region, which included a total of 110 offenses, 129 victims, and 121 known suspects (Figure 13). Compared to one and five years earlier, the number of offenses stayed the same and declined by 4 percent, respectively. In 2013, hate crimes were reported

Other hate crime information compiled for this summary includes the following.

- Of the 104 events for which motivation was documented, 60 percent appeared motivated by race, ethnicity, or national origin; 24 percent by sexual orientation; and 16 percent by religion. Of the 75 victims in incidents related to the victim's actual or perceived race/ethnicity/national origin, 49 percent were described as being anti-Black, 21 percent as anti-Hispanic, and 29 percent as other (which included White, Asian, as well as other categories not described).
- Of the 105 events where information was documented, the type of victim was an individual (or multiple individuals) for 85 percent, 8 percent a religious organization, 5 percent involved government property, and

3 percent was described as other. Seventy-five percent (75%) of the 116 victims where gender was documented were male.

- Of the 97 events where location was noted, 21 percent occurred on a driveway, highway, road, alley, or street; 21 percent at a residence or home; 12 percent at a business (which includes hotel/motel, restaurants, and gas stations); 9 percent at a school or college; 9 percent in jail or prison; 8 percent at a church, synagogue, or temple; 7 percent in a parking lot or garage or an airport/bus terminal; 7 percent in an outdoor area such as a field, woods, park, lake, waterway, or beach; and 5 percent at some other type of location.
- Of the 105 events, 70 percent were described as violent, which included 31 simple assaults, 23 acts of intimidation, 18 aggravated assaults, and 2 robberies. The rest (30%) were property-related and included 27 acts of vandalism or the destruction of property, 3 arsons, and 1 burglary (not shown).

# **CLEARANCE RATES**

A crime is cleared or solved for reporting purposes when at least one person is arrested and charged with the offense.<sup>9</sup> Not surprisingly, the clearance rates in 2013 varied by crime type, with violent crimes cleared more frequently than property crimes. Overall, 52 percent of violent crimes that were open for investigation in the region were cleared (with a range across departments of 43% in Oceanside to 81% in Ramona), compared to 15 percent of property crimes (with a range of 11% in Solana Beach to 34% in Ramona) (Appendix Tables 15 and 16).

As Figure 14 shows, the crimes of homicide and aggravated assault have the highest clearance rates, which is related to the fact that these crimes receive maximum resources given the seriousness of the crime and (for assault) involve individuals with face-to-face contact who may also already know one another. While the motor vehicle theft

clearance rate is the lowest of the seven Part I crimes, it is important to note that the vehicle recovery rate is considerably higher (75%)<sup>10</sup> (not shown).






# HOW DOES THE CITY OF SAN DIEGO COMPARE TO OTHER U.S. CITIES?

National information for crime rates for 32 U.S. cities (rather than counties or regions) with populations of 500,000 or more, and who met crime data submission deadlines, is currently available for calendar year 2012 (one year prior to the majority of other statistics presented in this report). In 2012, the City of San Diego<sup>11</sup> was the eighth largest city among the 32, with a population of 1.29 million. As Figures 15 and 16 show, the City of San Diego was one of the safest places to live, compared to other large metropolitan areas in terms of both violent crime (third lowest, following Honolulu, HI and San Jose, CA) and property crime (third lowest, following New York, NY and San Jose, CA). In the previous


year, San Diego was ranked third safest for violent crime and second safest for property crime (not shown).



# **SUMMARY**


In 2013, the violent crime rate was its second lowest in the past 30 years, decreasing from 2012 after a previous uptick. The number of homicides showed the greatest one-year decline (-33%), with a smaller percentage tied to gangs than in the previous year. Property crime was up slightly, an increase predominately tied to more larcenies, including thefts from vehicles and non-residential burglaries.
